The above photograph is from 1963 and the team includes some well-known players and officials from that era:

The coach that season was Leo Doolan. It is thought that he had been listed with North Melbourne FC in earlier times; however, there is no evidence of Leo playing a Senior Grade VFL match. A certain 'L. Doolan' was listed as a youngster of some ability with Werribee in earlier years. Leo was the coach at Dromana for only one year before stepping down when the former Richmond star, John Nix, was appointed in 1964.

Note: It is not clear if Leo is related to former NMFC midfielder/ utility Neil Doolan (103 games) who won the Gardiner Medal in 1951 and later represented Victoria. Neil coached Northcote to a VFA premiership in 1961.

Any reader with knowledge of Leo's football career is kindly asked to contact Roger. It is hoped that a story about Leo's time at Dromana FC can be pieced together and placed on record.

Officials in the group included Eric Oakes, Ed Buchanan, George Osborne, and Wally Guy (i.e. the goal umpire in the white coat). Younger readers may be unaware, that in earlier times, in most country leagues, each club was required to supply a goal and a boundary umpire for all grades.

THE MATTER OF UMPIRES IN LOCAL FOOTBALL


Further to the fact that Dromana supplied umpires in the 1960's, as a point of interest, 'neutral' umpires were not introduced in to the VFL until 1872. Believe it or not, prior to that, the captains of the teams awarded free kicks.

Considering that the first game of Australian Rules was played in 1858 (Scotch College v Melbourne Grammar) it took another fourteen years for the 'penny to drop' and the idea of independent umpires to 'take the whistle ' to be introduced.

Umpiring was also problematic matter in the formative days of the local competition. In 1893, complaints about the impartiality of umpires were common and openly published. The following extract is from 1905 and it seems that things had not improved a great deal...

"The secretary of the Peninsula Football Association is having a good deal more writing and worry over the umpire question than is considered a fair thing. First one club states they won't play under this umpire, and another club states they won't play under that umpire. Under, these circumstances it would be advisable for the delegates to meet at an early date, to consider what is best to be done in the matter, for if clubs refuse to play under Peninsula umpires it resolves itself into getting umpires from Melbourne and that is sure to prove costly."
