JACK BOOKER TAKES THE REINS AT PIER STREET

In football, indeed all sport, the coach plays a fundamental role in the development and success of the team; and, in 1971, the appointment of Jack Booker, as Senior XVIII coach at Dromana was a prudent decision. Under the leadership of Greg James in 1970, the club had laid a solid base upon which to build; and Jack Booker would prove to be the 'right man at the right time' to advance Greg's enthusiastic efforts.

Jack Booker was well known in country and suburban sport; and he had played with Yarraville in the VFA in the mid 1940's. One of the highlights of Jack's playing days was being awarded the Todd Medal for the Best & Fairest in the VFA Reserve Grade in 1944. He had also established himself as a leading player in the Mid Gippsland Football League in the 1950's.

It is recorded that in 1957, Jack kicked 21 goals for Hill End against Morwell Rovers; and he finished that season with a tally of 139 goals. Jack also won the 'Redmond Trophy' for the Best and Fairest player in the MGFL Reserves XVIII Grade when he was playing for Boolarra FC in 1961.



Jack was an adept cricketer and was a technically correct, methodical and stylish batsman who could offer strokes to all parts of the ground. Jack made the news when he bravely batted with a broken wrist to aid Yarraville Cricket Club to an exciting win against Hawthorn-East Melbourne in 1951...

Jack was a thoughtful person who set high standards for himself; and his background as a police officer and highly respected sportsman set an example for others to emulate. He was a stern and erudite coach who placed great emphasis on individual and collective disciple....

"John was very strict with is players and he had a no drink, no pub rule prior to every game. One day he found two of his best players on the local hotel and immediately suspended them from the Saturday game, which meant that he to play that day... He was a hard taskmaster but always fair in his dealings with his players and managed to get the best out of them..." Source: DFNC files.

When the local supporters became aware of Jack's reputation and his earlier success in coaching Nirranda FC, in the Purnim FL in the 1950's (see below); an air of expectation arose regarding the club's hopes in 1971.

Miles were worth it!

A man who is prepared to travel 10,204 miles in a season to play football deserves to win a premiership.

Jack Booker, captain and coach of Nirranda, in the Western District, did this in the recent season and his reward was his team's first premiership win in the Purnim and District League since 1928.

Jack, who is a police-man stationed at Yarraville, was offered the coaching job early in the season by a Nir-

randa committeeman.

He did not accept
until his Superintendent said he could get the necessary leave, provided that it fitted in with his days off duty.

Jack made the job fit in, although it meant that he had to Jack made the travel to Nirranda twice a week, once for train-ing on Tuesdays and again for the match on Saturdays.

A return trip meant 360 miles. On Tuesdays he would

45 and became an 1945 umpire in the Footscray District League, where he was still engaged when he was appointed to the Nirranda job.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 1971 SEASON.

- Jack Booker played an important role in local cricket in 1971 as he was coach of the Dromana Cricket Club XI which won the premiership. A good start for the New Year for Jack and the township.
- The opening round of the football season bought a bag of mixed and somewhat disappointing results. The Senior XVIII lost to Rye by ten points, the Reserves were defeated, the thirds were over-run by 13 goals but the Fourths 'saved the day' and claimed victory by 60 points.
- Dromana (12. 23. 95) chalked up its first win with a convincing performance against YCW (10.15.75).
- After the completion of Round: 4, Dromana sat on the seventh rung of the NFL Ladder.
- On the 8th of May Greg James had a tally of 21 goals; and Dromana (21.17. 143) put other clubs on notice with a definitive victory over the tough Pines outfit which could only manage 8. 14. 62.

- Senior Constable Jack Booker made the news when he apprehended a
 threatening and armed felon. Meanwhile, back at the football oval,
 Dromana caused an unexpected upset by demolishing Red Hill by six
 goals. Ray Fyson kicked three goals; and the best players were listed as
 Thorpe, Myers, Gourlay, Rose, Work and Good.
- Greg James booted ten goals in a superlative exhibition at full forward against Somerville. Ray Fyson kicked four goals and Dromana was well served by Thorpe, Work, Williams, Ferguson, Cooper and Matthews. With that win, Dromana held second position on the NFL ladder while Pearcedale, Rye and Crib Point were 'in the mix' also.
- In June, Daryl Grogan sustained a broken leg in the Reserves XVIII match against Bonbeach.
- Dromana thrashed Karingal by 16 goals. Greg James kicked six goals; and Col Matthews (4 goals), David Williams were prominent players.
- Dromana slipped back to third on the table after Pearcedale produced some scintillating football in the second half of the game to overcome Dromana by 16 points, Glen Fyson (3 goals), Work and Cooper were the best that day for DFC.
- In July, Dromana eclipsed the Navy in a one-sided affair. Dromana 36.24. 240 defeated the Navy 5.8.39. Greg James booted 10 goals, Ray (7 goals) and John Elliott and Allan Sullivan (4 each) starred.
- John Elliott kicked 4 goals in another sound performance against Crib Point. At that stage of the season, the club had won ten games and had built an imposing percentage of 170.1%
- In the 'Match of the Day' on July 17th, Dromana 14.12. 96 defeated Rye 11.12. 78. Best players for Dromana were: Work, Sullivan, Matthews, McCormick and Glen Fyson (3 goals).
- By late July the banner headline read: 'Dromana gave 'buds a football lesson'... Dromana 19.20 (134) defeated Rosebud 7.16 (58). John Elliott kicked 8 goals that day while Greg James and Ray Fyson chipped in with 4 goals. Bill Brindley won plaudits for another strong exhibition.
- The return match against YCW was played in atrocious conditions but DFC fell over the line in a tough tussle by 8 points. It was Dromana's 13th victory that season.
- Jack Booker's impact on the team was obvious as his boys whipped Langwarrin by 15 goals. Dromana was relentless in its run to the finals and looked unstoppable. Ray Fyson kicked five goals that day while John Elliott again proved a handy forward with three majors. The best players were listed as: McCormick, Williams, Fyson, Kerr and Thorpe.
- Things came together in the last week and Dromana grabbed top spot on the ladder with a seven goal victory against Pines FC
- The Final Four in the NFL in 1972 was:

Dromana: 60 points
 Pearcedale: 58 points
 Rye: 56 points
 Crib Point: 50 points

Those clubs finishing outside the four were: Rosebud (46 points), YCW (42), Langwarrin (40), Bonbeach (32), Somerville (28), Red Hill (16) and Navy Depot (8 points).

- The DFC Reserves finished third (50 points), the Thirds were 12th on the table (8 points) and the Fourths won eight games for the season to sit eighth on the ladder.
- In the NFL goal kicking award, Greg James finished second with 68 goals.
- Pat Brewer came Runner-up in the Fourth XVIII competition with 26 votes.





JACK BOOKER - A MAN ON A MISSION



In his book entitled 'Premiership Football' (1984), David Parkin wrote...

"Successful coaching is based upon on how a coach leads and interacts with his players. How he teaches and communicates is just as important as what he teaches and communicates, and how he organizes and conducts practice sessions is as important as what or how much is covered at practice." Chapter: 8 Page: 153

Over the years, there have been various comments about Jack Booker's stint(s) as a coach; and, bearing in mind David Parkin's thoughts on successful coaches, Dromana Football Club should be eternally thankful that Jack Booker arrived at Pier Street in 1971.

Jack was a 'man on a mission' in 1971. He was earnest, forthright, organized, knowledgeable and, above all, single-minded in taking his team to the 'top of the table.'

Jack set new standards for all listed players; and the 1971 pennant again exemplified the 'power of one' in lifting the sights of others. Jack realized what DFC needed to do attain success; and those uninformed onlookers, who decried Jack's judgement, in defining new benchmarks at Dromana, were much chastened when the premiership flag was hoisted at Pier Street...

"Self-discipline is without a doubt one of the most important traits that is 100% essential to accomplish your goals. You need to have self-discipline in order to become the best that you can be...'

Jack Booker deserves eternal credit for 'delivering a flag' in his first season as coach. He coached again in 1972 and in 1975 but those stories can wait for another time. 1971 was a big enough chapter in the story of the club; and it is probably best to allow readers to reflect upon that spectacular victory.
