
'CHANCES WENT BEGGING'

THE 'B GRADE' FIRST SEMI-FINAL DROMANA V ROSEBUD-1938

Reference: 2022/11



INTRODUCTION-1938: POOR CONVERSION PROVES COSTLY

Having claimed the pennant in 1937 (under the name of Dromana District FC), the Dromana team had shown enough promise in 1938 to feel optimistic about making its way into another Grand Final. The team had performed quite well throughout 1938 having won nine of its fourteen outings and was sitting third on the PFA 'B' Grade Ladder at the end of the Home and Away series. However, defeats by Tyabb-Hastings (Round: 10) and Red Hill in Round: 13 were ominous warnings in the looming battles.

Rosebud had battled its way into the finals (via a play-off: see below) with an impressive 26 point victory over Red Hill; and had consequently earned the right to 'face off' against Dromana in the Semi-Final at Hastings.

Lame excuses should never be used to explain poor performances in sporting contests but, judging from the final scores in the Semi-Final against Rosebud, there appears that wayward kicking for goal cost Dromana any chance for a tilt at a successive premiership title.

In that final, Dromana had twenty-two scoring shots to Rosebud's sixteen; and, as will be seen later in this article, when it mattered most, inaccuracy in front of goal, thwarted any hope of the team going deeper into the finals. The hackneyed phrase that 'bad kicking is bad football' seems true; and Dromana FC paid a heavy price for failing to convert its numerous opportunities in attack.

THE BACKGROUND TO THE 1938 SEASON



In 1938, Mr J. Glourey was elected to the position of MPFL President and Mr Telford took on the central role of league secretary. Mr Birch and Mr Carrigg (see below) were Dromana's elected delegates to the MPFL that season. The structure of the MPFL in 1938 was again based on two divisions as explained:

The affiliates of 'A' Grade were: Sorrento, Hastings-Tyabb, Mornington, Frankston, Somerville, Seaford- Carrum and the Navy Deport. The 'B' Grade competition comprised clubs from: Dromana, Balnarring, Baxter, Frankston, Rosebud, Red Hill, Pearcedale and Hastings-Tyabb.

Note: Frankston and Hastings-Tyabb entered teams in both divisions that season (which gave an indication of their relative depth).

THE DROMANA LIST

The list of players who represented Dromana in 1938 included: S. McLear, R.Hosking, B. Aust, K. Greer, B. Temby, A. Hosking, V. McLaren, R. Birch, J. Shaw, McDougall, H. Lyng, M. Gourlay, A. O' Malley, G. McLear J. Cornish, V. Hazeldine, R. Wilson, A. Griffith, R. Griffith, (?) Sweet, V. Humphrey, H. McLear, and (?) Williams. It is believed that Sam McLear was the club captain throughout 1938.

CLEARANCES IN 1938

In 1938, the Dromana District combined team, of the previous season, had been disbanded as both Rosebud and Red Hill had decided to 'stand-alone' in the local competition.

Consequently, there was a considerable degree of inter-club movement as players from the premiership team of 1937 returned 'home'. Some of the players who sought clearances to local clubs included:

THE KICK OFF TO SEASON 1938

The 'B' Grade competition 'kicked off' on May 21st and Dromana was scheduled to play Rosebud at home. It would have been a match to create a lot of local interest as Rosebud FC had some very talented footballers. Some of the family names listed with Rosebud that season included: Brady Cameron, Wong, Lacco, Jensen, Wood, Ragg, Nichols, Godfrey, Jennings, Freeman, Dowling, Ireland, Liversidge, Gibbon, Carter, Johnstone, Brown and Chadwick.

For a small-town newspaper, 'The Standard' went to great lengths to promote and publicize the MPFL. Match details (for most games) were published; and, in each issue, there was an entire page devoted to local football. The results of Dromana's fixtures throughout the Home and Away Series are shown below. In some cases, there were no scores / details recorded and, in one instance, the newspaper report was indecipherable due to the poor condition of the surviving copy.

NOTE: As can be seen above, at the half way mark of the season, Dromana sat in third position on the 'B' Grade Ladder. The other teams in the 'Four' were: Hastings-Tyabb, Frankston and Rosebud. Pearcedale and Baxter had won only one game. While Hastings-Tyabb and Frankston seemed assured of finals action, Balnarring and Red Hill were still 'in touch' and had a chance to 'sneak into' the finals with seven rounds left to play. The beauty of an eight-team competition is that all clubs have a '50-50' chance to make the Final Four.

Dromana finished the season with 9 wins (36 points). The defeat by Rosebud, in Round: 1, by less than a goal, must have been galling. However, the battle for fourth position had not been resolved as both Red Hill and Rosebud had finished with 28 points. Readers will notice that team percentages are not listed in the extract and, it appears, that in the league rules in that era, a playoff was required if teams had tied on the same number of wins.

NOTE: Under that system, it would be interesting if, for example, three teams (e.g. 4^{th} , 5^{th} and 6^{th}) had recorded the same numbers of wins after 14 rounds.



THE 'B' GRADE PLAY-OFF FOR FOURTH POSITION

The B Grade Replay for a finals berth was played at the Rosebud Oval on the 3rd of September; and Rosebud 9.23 (77) defeated Red Hill 7.9 (51). There were no other details published about that game.

It is difficult to gauge if the Saturday 'furlough' for Dromana would prove to be beneficial. Often, a week's rest can aid teams but history shows that there are no fixed rules. Finals football often throws up surprises as Hastings-Tyabb would discover as the series unfolded that season.

ROSEBUD WIN SEMI-FINAL DROMANA V. ROSEBUD AT HASTINGS

(By "Full Back")

"THE first semi-final of the B grade was played between the above mentioned teams on the Hastings ground on Saturday last, and after a rather poor game, Rosebud ran out winners by 9 points. It was an ideal day for football. The ground was in very good order after the heavy rains of the previous day, and speaks well for the great improvements carried out at the Hastings Park.

The attendance was fair considering the counter attraction at Mornington and the gate takings amounted to over £9, and compares favourably with the takings at B grade finals of previous years. Both teams were fully represented, and each took the field confident of victory, and a good game was looked forward to; but unfortunately the standard of play was not the best, being

mostly of a scrambling nature, but the Rosebud team making the most of the opportunities, safely held their opponents and won the day. Dromana had 22 scoring shots to 16 by Rosebud, so were very unlucky in kicking for goal."

The final scores that day were: Rosebud 9.7 (61) defeated Dromana 6.16 (52). Unfortunately, there were no goal kickers or best players listed in that match report. The teams can also be seen in the original extract (below).



FOOTNOTES TO THE 1938 SEMI-FINAL

- 1. Dromana's scores, throughout 1938, indicate that the team's inaccuracy in front of goal was not uncommon. Wayward kicking in Round: 1 (Rosebud), Round: 3 (Hastings-Tyabb) and in Round: 8 (Rosebud) indicated frequent poor conversion rates that season.
- 2. The umpire appointed to the above game was Mr Holden. He received praise for his good control and consistency in his decision making.
- 3. The other match officials were: Messrs Jinette and Jones (time-keepers), Kerr and Haddock (boundary umpires) and the goal umpires were Mr House and Mr Cubbitt.
- 4. In that Semi-Final, Dromana, three McLear brothers took the field. They were an amazing trio as Sam played 218 games with DFC, Henry (234 games) and George McLear played 207 games with the club.
- 5. George McLear also played three games with Richmond in 1914; and another brother, James, played with Essendon in 1919.
- 6. According to the records of DFNC, the offspring and relatives of the McLear family played a total of senior 3059 games with Dromana in the period 1908-1980. 'Three cheers for the McLears' would seem apt.
- 7. Readers will notice that Wally Guy was not mentioned in the above match report. Wally played with Sorrento in the 'A' Grade division of the league in 1938.
- 8. Wally had a stellar season in local football; and finished third in the Kirton Medal for the Best and Fairest Player in the 'A' Grade competition. As is well known, Wally was a one the finest players to have ever 'pulled on a boot' in Peninsula football. Wally also broke in to VFL ranks and played 8 games with North Melbourne in 1934.



9. At that moment, far from the tranquil hamlet of Dromana, Adolf Hitler was causing disturbing unrest and would soon plunge Europe into war. Some of the men who had played for DFC in that 1938 Semi-Final would be wearing 'different colours (e.g. khaki) within a year or two.

Further to the above, Dromana footballers known to have enlisted to undertake military service during World War: II included: Bert Aust, Reg Birch, Bill Gourlay, Alf O'Malley, Vern Humphrey, Reg Bevis, Elgar Pittock, Gordon Jennings, Vin Hazeldine, Eric Pritchard, Peter Branchi, Ernie Myers, Rupert Griffiths, Les Wiseman, Spencer Brown, Reg Bailey, John 'Jack' Clydesdale, Norm Osborne and Ern Rudduck.



John 'Jack' Clydesdale who served with the RAAF during World War: II. At least six members of the Clydesdale family wore the DFC colours. Jack's sons Jim (77 games) and Kevin (94 games) played in the DFC 1950 premiership team.

11. The Second Semi-final between Hastings-Tyabb and Frankston was played at Dromana Oval the following weekend. In a surprise result, Frankston claimed the 'B' Grade pennant with a spirited, seven point victory over the Hastings-Tyabb combine. It was a stunning win as Hastings-Tyabb had gone through 1938 undefeated. Frankston won the premiership in both divisions that season.

That Hec. Downing, of Rosebud club, has won the Whitlock medal which is donated annually by Mr. Gordon Whitlock of Hastings, life member and past president and delegate of the P.F.L., for the best and fairest player in B grade of the league. We extend our congratulations to Mr. Downing and also to Rosebud club.

- 12.Hec Downing, of Rosebud FC (see above) won the Whitlock Medal for the Best and Fairest in the 'B' Grade competition. Hec was touted as a brilliant forward and it was known, that in the match against Balnarring that season, he booted 11 goals.
- 13. The above Semi-Final was played on the 10th September; and readers may be interested to know, that, on that same day Carlton defeated Geelong in the VFL Semi-final by 32 points. In a superb exhibition at full forward, Carlton's Ken Baxter booted 8 goals. Carlton went onto to win the flag that year (see photograph below).

HISTORY IN THE MAKING: 96,834 ATTEND THE 1938 VFL GRAND FINAL.

Football history was made in 1938. Carlton overcame Collingwood by 15 points to win the 1938 Grand Final and a record crowd of 96,834 witnessed the spectacle. Jim Park, who starred for the Blues that day, died on active service in New Guinea in February 1943.

OBITUARY

MR. LOUIS CARRIGO.

Mr. L. Carrigg, who was well known throughout the Peninsula, died at his residence in Dromana on Tuesday. Mr. Carrigg was the proprietor of the Hotel Dromana and for saveral years occupied the position of president of the Dromana football club. He also represented his club at the delegates' meetings on numerous occasions. Mr. Carrigg leaves a widow and a daughter, Burial took place at the Dromana cemetery on Wednesday.
