2017 – 'LIFT OFF' ONWARD & UPWARD

INTRODUCTION- 'LIFT OFF' AT PIER STREET IN 2017.

One of the outstanding highlights of the 2017 season was Dromana's seven game winning streak from Round: 6 to Round: 12. There have been other impressive consecutive victories in the club's long history; but few, if any, were as important in carrying the club forward as was witnessed in 2017.

At the end of Round: 5, Dromana had secured only one victory and was languishing near the bottom of the Nepean FL Ladder. However, in an amazing form reversal and surge, the Tigers were in the Five by the end of Round: 12.

It was a spectacular rise up the ladder and the transformation in form was startling. Coach Rikki Johnston received great credit for the 'turnaround in fortunes' because, despite the early losses, he coached with unwavering conviction and confidence. As is often the case in coaching sporting teams, Rikki's honest belief in the 'process and the cause' was infectious and was fully embraced by his young playing group.



Rikki Johnston never lost faith in his young playing group and with hard work and a united spirit lifted his team to new heights in 2017 and gave the supporters an insight to what was 'around the corner' in 2018 and 2019. Rikki is currently coaching at the Frankston Dolphins VFA. His leadership and dedicated service at Pier Street was unparalleled and he is regarded by all local supporters as a true champion on and off the field.

Following a sluggish start, by mid-season, the Tigers were playing a very attractive brand of running-possession football; and the emergence and maturation of the 'younger brigade' during that period was apparent.

It was a classic case of 'boiled lollies to chocolates' during the winning streak; and the officials, members and supporters were impressed with what unfolded in those matches.

The seven successive victories included two 10-goal margins and on two occasions Dromana kicked in excess of 120 points.

Note: Younger readers may be interested to know that the longest winning streak in AFL football was recorded by Geelong (26 consecutive wins) in 1952-53. As in life, 'all good things come to an end'; and Collingwood eventually stopped the Cats' 'in their tracks' at Kardina Park in Round: 14 in 1953.



THE TIGERS FALL SHORT IN 2017



At that stage of the season, the Tigers had worked their way into the Five and sat in fifth position on the NFL Ladder with 8 wins and a percentage of 120.22%. The other clubs making up the Five were: Sorrento, Rosebud, Frankston and Hastings.

Sadly in life and football, all good things must come to an end; and the seven-game winning streak concluded at Pier Street in Round: 13 when Frankston: 13.9.(97) defeated Dromana: 11.9. (75).

The race to the finals had been exciting; and, at one stage, in the last few weeks of the season, the percentage difference between Dromana and Red Hill was a mere 1.64%.

Mathematics came to the fore in the Tigers' fortunes in 2017; and who could ever forget the scene as supporters gathered in the club rooms to await the results from other local matches. All eyes were on Graham Stelling (who had access to the MPNFL lives scores) as players, officials and supporters awaited 'his call.'

Having completed his calculations, Graham announced that the Tigers had just failed, in their quest to make the finals, by some 5%. So near yet so far; and everyone could only think thought about what might have been. However, time would prove the old adage...

"That good things come to those who wait but better things come to those who work for them."

PERCENTAGE REALLY MATTERS IN FOOTBALL

For our younger readers, the team's percentage during the season is calculated by dividing the points for (total points) by the points against (i.e. Total points kicked by opposition teams).

Using the example of Dromana in the above table: Dromana points for: 1713 ÷1351 (total points against) x 100=126.79%

Bearing the above in mind, it is important for footballers to appreciate that every point scored in a match can have consequences over a season. It is important that players try to eradicate 'easy' opposition goals (e.g. 50 metre penalties) and to fight desperately to the final siren in each and every game.

THE TIGERS ROAR IN 2018

Rikki Johnston's first year as coach had been imposing in two ways. Not only had he staunched the bleeding at the club but had revived spirit and restored collective belief in the club.

It was indeed disappointing for Dromana to miss the Final Five by 5.5% but the club had issued a strong warning across the Peninsula for the years ahead.

As most readers know, 2018 would deliver the benefits of the renewal in a way in which the club's loyal supporters could only dream.
